CELEBRATING THE LEGACIES OF OUR BELOVED MS GONCALVES AND MR AND MRS WATT

We celebrated Arbor Week with an assembly dedicated to the importance of trees and activities focused on trees. We ended off the week with a ceremony in which 3 Pompom trees were planted in the front garden near the bridge, in honour of Miss Goncalves, Mrs Watt and Mr Watt.

Erin Towert (gr 11) explained the significance of choosing the Pompom trees: "The Pompom tree or "dais cotinifolia" is indigenous to South Africa and it is the tree of the year for 2022. They usually flower over Christmas and resemble giant candy floss as the tree develops clouds of soft pink balls. They prefer to grow on the margins of forests, wooded hill slopes and stony kloofs. These trees only grow up to 6 meters and are deciduous during the colder seasons, meaning they shed their leaves during Autumn and Winter.

The word "dais" in Dais cotinfolia is the Greek word meaning torch. In some way Ms G and Mrs Watt influenced aspects of our lives like turning on our torches: igniting our ambitions, pushing us towards achieving our dreams, encouraging all of us to be brave and successful young women when we struggled with anxiety and stress and feeling overwhelmed.

They helped us to see what could be when we were struggling to see at all. Ms G and Mrs Watt have "lit the way" for many Jeppe girls, PAST, PRESENT and FUTURE.

151 schools from across South Africa with 2807 learners participated in the 6th annual online Geography Olympiad on 17 May. Jeppe Girls had 28 entrants and placed first in the public school section and third overall. Well done to all the learners who took part and did so well and well done too to their amazing Geography teachers!

Four of our girls were invited to enter the second round of the Geography Olympiad: Aarifah Loonat (Gr 12), Alisia Naidoo (Gr 12), Serah Garbutt (Gr 11) and Rumaisa Ilyas (Gr 11). It took place on 3rd and 4th June and involved essay writing under exam conditions.

Round two was based around shopping malls—South Africa ranks 8th in the world in terms of the highest number of shopping malls. Countries with more people and money than us, have fewer shopping malls. South Africa is in a state of saturation in terms of shopping malls and we should not be building any more. South Africa needs fewer malls, smaller malls and ones that support the full range of needs of all urban residents. The task for the learners was to see how as geographers they could use what they know about urban geography to solve South Africa's shopping mall problem. They had to present their ideas with supporting examples, details or information and convince the reader that their solutions were good and would make urban spaces better for all in the short and long term.

Our girls were commended for their wonderful effort and encouraged to pursue careers in Geography.

The girls spent one day attending lectures across all faculties at Wits. The National English Olympiad is an English language and literature competition that draws over 8000 entries each year from around South Africa and its neighbouring countries. The competition is organised jointly by the Grahamstown Foundation and the South African Council for English Education.

The examination was written in March of this year. The theme was "The Future: Utopia or Dystopia" and the self-study examination was based on a collection of fiction and non-fiction texts entitled A Brave New World. Candidates presented literary analyses that engaged with a variety of social issues, from the selfishness of humanity and whether or not the future inspires hope or anticipates disaster, to the calamitous destruction of free will resulting from human desire and arrogance.

Of the 30 Jeppe Girls who participated in the examination, 11 received a silver award, which is between 70 and 79% and two learners received a gold award, which is between 80-89%.


Kaylee, Robyn and Fay were also selected for the Imperial Lions Women's Emerging Team.
